MEDIA STUDIES

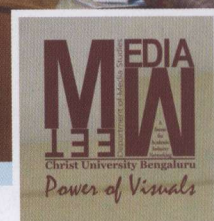

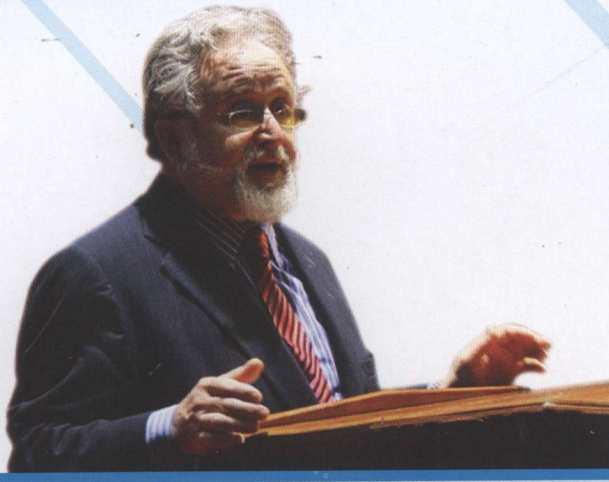

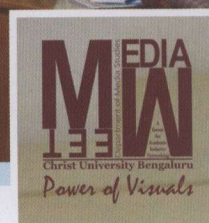

DEPARTMENT OF
ECONOMICS

Economics lies at the heart of the modern world and is a subject critical to both business success and effective policy making, never more so than at the present moment. In

studying undergraduate economics at Christ University you will explore and understand the economic issues that dominate the news agenda and shape the world in which we live.

The Department of Economics began its activities for the year 2015-16 with the inauguration of the Economics Association - AMARTYA' on 29th June 2015. The chief guest for the programme was Prof C T Kurien, renowned Economist and former Chairman of Madras Institute of Development



Studies (MIDS), Chennai. As part of classroom activities, the students of BA Economics (Hons) organised a panel discussion on the topic “Greek Debt Crisis” and also conducted ‘Eco-Talkies’, a forum to discuss different contemporary issues. Additionally, the Economics Association raised the bar for competition, quality and execution with its signature event, “ALTIUS” which was held on 20th November 2015. The event saw participation from leading colleges all across India. Other fests such as “Economico: The 1776 Syndrome” and “Quantanomics” brought plethora of events that are not just challenging but are also out of the box and aimed at fostering students of economics to think analytically. This gave them the opportunity to apply their knowledge and skills in simulated situations. The PG student seminars were conducted on contemporary concerns such as urban planning and development, oil crisis and World Development Report, 2015. A seminar was also organised to pay tribute to Nobel Laureate John

Nash through an exposition of his life and works. As part of class activity hour, a movie screening session on the ‘Beautiful Mind’ and a Quiz program on economics, culture and society were conducted. Weekly journal club activity involved students sharing their research ideas and review of scholarly works with their peers. Under CSA initiative, students visited Hoskote village to understand the effectiveness of micro-credit programmes in the village.

A national level post-graduate fest was held which saw the participation of leading colleges across the country and engaged students in intellectually stimulating events. A number of guest lectures were also conducted largely in the areas of macroeconomic developments and concerns. The academic year ended with the National Conference on ‘Environment, Economy and Human Well being’ where a few students presented well researched papers.



DEPARTMENT OF
HISTORY AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

The summer of 2015 showed a promising future for the 1st year International Studies students who interned in various organizations before their orientations programme in June. The students were addressed by various experts ranging from Professor Stephen Tankel, Dr. Anshuman Behera to former diplomats such as Prof. R. P Kaushik and even the Former Chief of Army Staff, General Bikram Singh regarding the topic “National Security: Threats, Challenges and Strategies”. In a span of 4 months, they released three issues of their newsletter; the first one “Beyond their Borders” was released on 31st July by Prof. Rajaram Nagappa of National Institute of Advance Studies Bangalore. The department conducted national conferences on topics such as “Sub-regional Cooperation in South Asia: India, Sri Lanka and Maldives” for which more than 40 scholars along with 70 student participants contributed to its success. Mr. Salman Haider and Ms. Leela Ponnappa were the chief guests for this event. The department of history and international studies aims

at diversifying the learning experiences and widening the horizons of students from across history and looks at new aspects that can be brought into history as a subject. The department organizes various seminars, workshops and activities and brings in experts from the field to give students training and exposure in the field of history. Through the past year the department of History and International Studies organized various seminars and hosted many events in the campus. In the past year the department got a lot of recognition and this department truly looks to expand the boundaries and put in new aspects to the field of history.



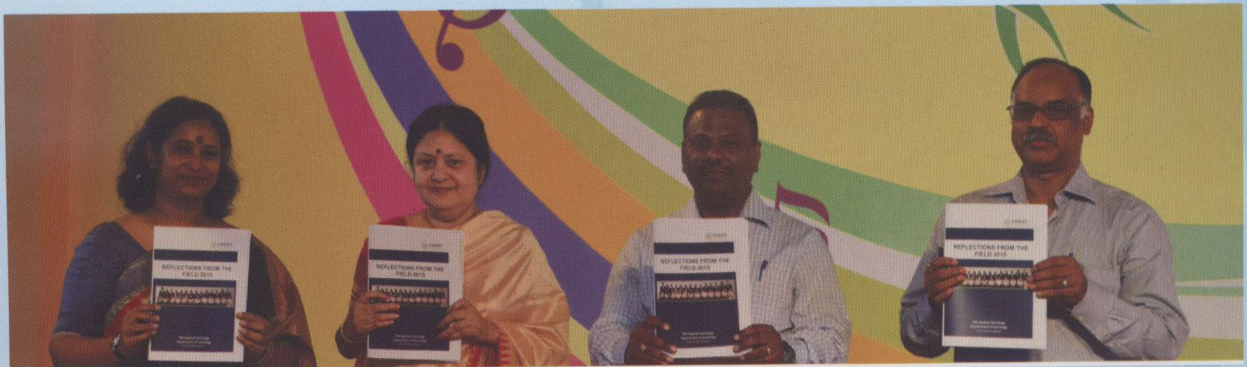
DEPARTMENT OF
SOCIOLOGY

The Department of Sociology has had another eventful year which has been enriching for both the students and the faculty. The Department has initiated numerous activities and has taken up a student exchange program with the University of Tubingen, Germany. The students of MA Applied Sociology and III year BA had gone a field visit to Hoskote as part of the rural exposure exercise. Some of the students already interned in these villages during the summer break and they acted as guides. As part of this visit, the students had prepared modules on training the teachers on the use of flashcards and other teaching resources, on health and sanitation as well as modules on food and nutrition. These modules were designed in a culturally sensitive fashion. This social sensitivity of the discipline was ingrained in the students who reflected this in the work done by them during their internships,

dissertations as well as the Service Learning projects that they have worked on. One such exercise was the campaign carried out by the students of III year BA to encourage people to follow safety guidelines and use the then newly constructed sky walk in front of the University. The students have presented papers and ideas in Seminars and Panel Discussions on areas like Social Change, Poverty, Indian Middle classes. There were workshops on Corporate Social Responsibility, Fair Trade, Academic Writing and on the need for Social Sensitization. Guest



lectures have been organized by researchers and members of the alumni to orient the students on contemporary areas of research such as on Development Induced Displacement and Resettlement, Fair Trade and Ethnographic research. The Department also conducted its two annual events, Sambandh in September and Young Sociologist in December 2015. The broad theme that the Department had adopted for these events was Human Rights.



DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WORK

As a leading institute in Social Work education, the department made visible progress towards its goal in the academic year 2015-2016 by introducing two new specialization programmes in Social Work: MSW Human Resource Management and MSW Clinical and Community Practice. Various activities organised by the department in this academic year like weeklong orientation programme for freshers, intensive internships, interactive workshops, seminars, research conferences and rural camps for the students and lectures by eminent professionals helped the students to develop required competencies, acquire knowledge and necessary skills for the social work profession. The major achievements of the department in the academic year 2015-16 include organising Decennial celebration,



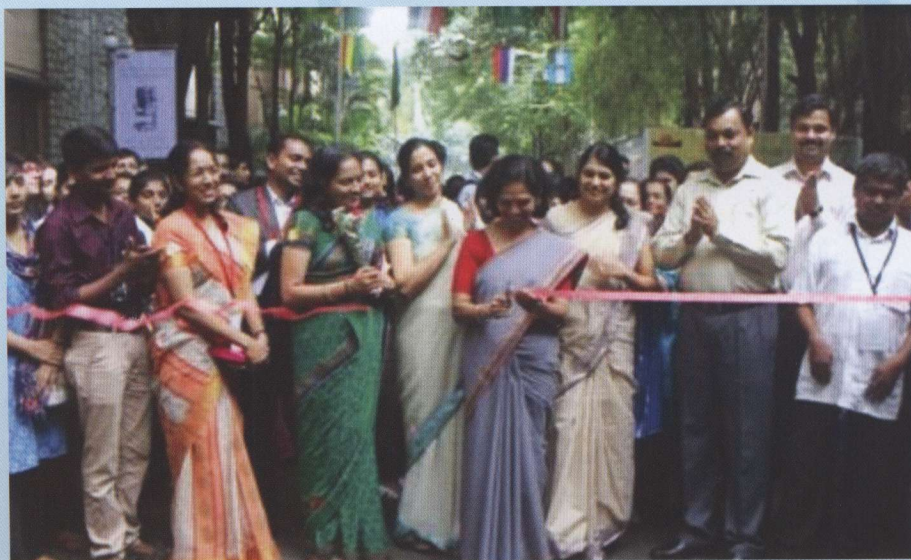
introduction of Service Learning programme (as part of the curriculum), organising four National Conferences and one International Conference, Women Empowerment Programme for the support staff of the University, two training programmes sponsored by the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and one training by the Integrated Child Protection Society (ICPS), NGO meet and a national seminar in collaboration with International Justice mission



on Human Trafficking. This was also a historical year as the Department established linkages with Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS) to enhance the quality of social work education. Prof. Parasuraman, Director of TISS, Prof. P K Shajahan, Chairperson, Centre for Community Organisation and Development Practice, TISS, Prof. Jairam, Former Director, Centre for Research, TISS, Prof. Devi Prasad, Chairperson, Centre for Equity and Justice for Children and Families, TISS and Dr. Asha Bhanu, Associate Professor, Centre for Health, visited the department as resource persons for quality improvement programmes and contributed to enhancing the quality of teaching-learning process especially in the areas of research and consultancy services, extension activities, student support services and innovations.

Department's 2015-16 strategic plan initiatives created a learner-centric academic environment by exploring the possibilities of innovative

approaches in teaching and learning, strengthening the curriculum by review by external experts, enhancing the quality of teaching learning process and promoted research and consultancy related activities. Major structural changes were formation of curriculum advisory cell, research development committee, monitoring of teaching learning process by faculty member, initiated a system for collaborative research by faculty and students and involvement of alumni in academic activities. The feedback from students, alumni members and experts from the industry helped the department to revise and modify the curriculum. There were 9 publications by faculty members in the department, which includes 4 joint publications by faculty and students. The department also published 'Socia' -Decennial Souvenir, Book of Abstracts and Conference Souvenir – South Asian Conference of Professional Social Workers. The Department also strengthened the academia – Industry connects this year.



DEPARTMENT OF
THEATRE STUDIES

The department of Theatre Studies spearheads the Shakespearean and Mega production of the University. This year the Shakespearean production was the bard's evergreen tragedy *King Lear* and the Mega production was based on Robert Bolt's *A Man For All Seasons*. The department hosted the theatre festival 'Spotlight' which showcased the theatrical skills of the students in various genres starting with an original play by the first years called *Toujours*, the second year students performed excerpts from Arthur Miller's *Death of a Salesman* and *The Crucible* capped with a riveting performance of Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. The



final year students who are also the pioneering Theatre Studies students performed on stage the Greek tragedy *Medea* and the famous Broadway musical *Oliver* which is based on Charles Dickens' novel *Oliver Twist* to discerning theatre aficionados among whom was the famous fashion guru Prasad Bidapa.



DEPARTMENT OF PERFORMING ARTS AND THEATRE IN EDUCATION

With more than 30 events in 2015-16 involving performances and audience Theatre-in-Education and Department of Performing Arts averaged over 3 performances every month for the 10 working months in an academic year. With 100 odd students and 5 faculty member the level of social interaction achieved through performance alone was remarkable. With majority of the work being done at rehearsal labs where ideas were generated and experimented over many hours of work – the education sector has a new paradigm of looking at Performing Arts as a medium for Social Interaction. Pedagogic League brings 1000 students to the playground as dance participants. The rehearsals, planning, coordination and performance facilitates interaction of deaneries, sports department, sports enthusiasts, and dignitaries towards this common event. Teacher's day celebrated on 5th September 2015, got focused as a creative space for social interaction. Gratitude and respect for teachers were brought to the forefront for all through performances in Dance and Music. Tyagaraja Mahotsav, a Department of Performing Arts initiative is organized to remember the Carnatic Musician - Thyagaraja.

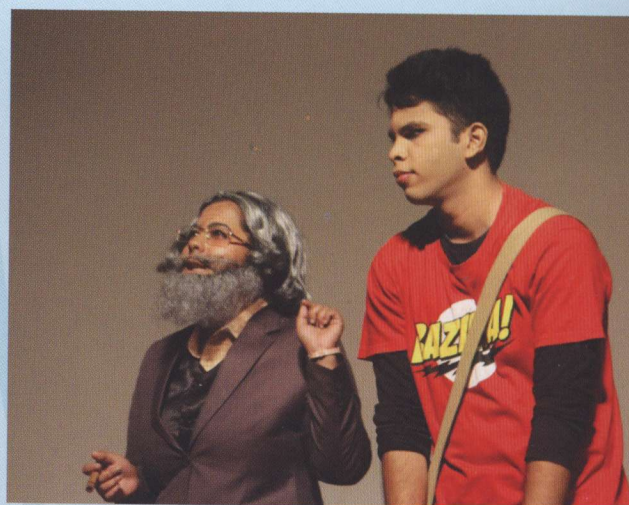


This program celebrates the compositions of Thyagaraja where the students from across the University led by the Music Majors of second year and third year along with other Performing Arts students sing various compositions. *Nritta – University Dance Day* is considered the most popular event in the campus – this event brings 100's of dancers and 1000's of audience members across campuses together and is one of the most awaited social events of the University.

PSYCHOLOGY

The department of Psychology had an enriching academic year with a unique collaboration of academic as well as extracurricular programs. The students acted in a play called "The Misfits" as a part of their class internal assessment for the Positive Organisational Behaviour course and in coordination with Studio for Movement Arts and Therapies organized a two-day workshop on 'A Transcendent Journey through the Mother-Line'. The department arranged another workshop for photo clinical application



of psychoanalysis in the Asian context. The department conducted a national seminar on 'Child Protection: Empowering Mental Health Professionals' along with a workshop for teachers and educators with the theme 'Children in a changing world: Specific challenges and issues for teachers'. Young Psychologist competition as well as a psychology exhibition was conducted by the department.



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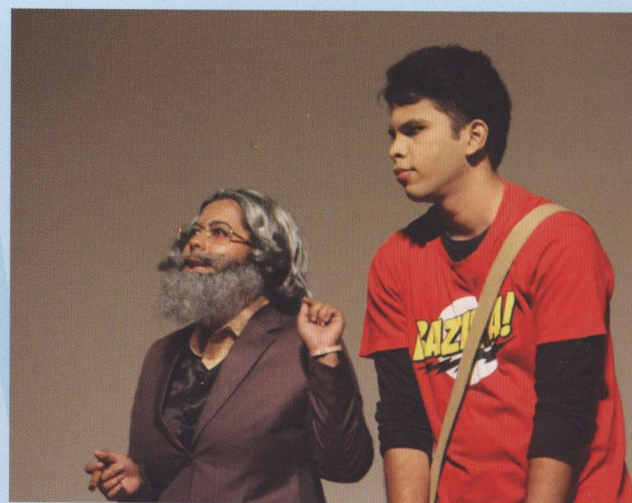


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SCHOOL OF EDUCATION



The department organises manifold programmes, workshops and seminars throughout the course to develop the skills and knowledge of the students. The 2015-17 was the first batch to start the two year B.Ed programme. The course commenced with workshops, cultural programmes, ice-breaking activities, theatre in education etc. The programme teaches to use communication and its components as a tool for better learning experience. Panel discussions and workshops were held to prepare the learners towards training the next-generation students. Practical experience is essential to develop actual classroom management skills of the students. The students were exposed to internships in different



schools to help them understand lesson planning, administration and other practical aspects of teaching. One of the events in the School of Education is Kalasaurabha—a cultural and literary event which brings the students together in its spirit of competition. This event brought much fun and frolic to the curriculum and also helped one to value the importance of co-curricular activities.



DEPARTMENT OF
PHYSICS

The Physics department took initiative in starting a new course on Cosmology and Astrobiology by eminent physicist, Prof. C Shivaram as the resource person. A Certificate course taken by Prof. Jayant Murthy gave an overview in Astronomy and Astrophysics touching on the topics thru solar system to cosmology. Also this course gave a brief introduction to various astronomical techniques like Adaptive optics, Space Telescopes etc.

On 16th December, 2015, the MSc Physics students went to a village called Mudavadi which is 11km from Kolar. The main purpose of this trip was to explore the village culture, their lifestyle, to understand the problems they faced and to motivate them to take up higher goals in their future. The students interacted with them on contemporary topics like water conservation, solar energy, wind energy, deforestation and 'Swatch Bharath'.

In order to foster interactions with eminent scientists, Physics department organized several guest lectures in frontier areas in physics.

A special lecture series was arranged for astrophysics students by scientists from IIA. Dr.

Preeti Karb, Dr. Lalitha Sairam and Dr. Ram Sagar were among the speakers. Dr. Naveen Kumar CM, Scientific Staff, Julich Centre for Neutron Science, Oak Ridge, USA, an alumnus of Christ University gave a talk on "Structure determination by X-Ray and Neutron powder diffraction: Basics and beyond" on July 14, 2015 which was followed by a hands on Training on X-Ray diffraction analysis software-"Full Proof" on July 22, 2015. Dr. Ranjan Gupta, IUCAA, Pune, gave a talk on "Upcoming Large Telescopes" on November 30, 2015. It was a pleasure to see lively discussions and exchange of ideas after every talk. Prof. Sankeshwar, guest faculty of the department gave a talk on "Physics at Nano scales" on February 8, 2016. There was a talk on Quantum Tunneling by Prof. Sarmista Sahu, MLA College, Malleshwaram on February 22, 2016.

In order to foster interaction between students of various disciplines, departments of Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics jointly organised a science festival to encourage the PG science students on November 24, 2015 at Kengeri campus.

The department organized several educational trips for MSc students to many scientifically important places.

Students of II M.Sc. attended various summer and winter schools organized by ARIES, IIA, Western Ontario University, few students presented



their project work in National level conferences like National Space Science Symposium 2016, Andhra Pradesh State Conference and IISER conference on Nanoscience and Technology. Two of the students submitted the work entitled "Spec Polarimeter observations on the low frequency type V Solar Radio Bursts" to the Solar Physics journal; Springer Publications.



DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY

The department of Chemistry began their activity for the academic year through the Chemistry association launch that was inaugurated in August 2015 by Dr. Uday Maitra from IISc, Bengaluru. The department launched an Incubation centre which is targeted towards research oriented students. An intercollegiate science fest "Chemoz" was organised by the department in the month of September 2015 to inculcate scientific temper, event management skills and social interaction skills among the students. Students from 14 colleges in and around Bengaluru participated in the fest. "Spirit" as the name suggests, an interactive interclass fest was held on 12 December 2015 to bridge the gap between the spirited chemistry students of various BSc courses.



The department of Chemistry not only helps to foster learning and empower scholastic elevation but it also encourages the young minds to be compassionate to the destitute and the less privileged. BSc students arranged an awareness programme on pollution, nutrition, personal hygiene and carrier guidance to the students of Sardar Vallabhaipatel High school in Sarjapur, Bengaluru. To keep the flame of togetherness alive in all, the students came together and contributed original articles pertaining to chemistry which culminated in the release of the coveted newsletter "Chemmunique" in February 2016.



DEPARTMENT OF
LIFE SCIENCES

The department of Life Sciences aims at diversifying the learning experiences and widening the horizons of the students from across the disciplines of Botany, Zoology and Biotechnology. The department organises manifold programs, workshops and seminars throughout the course to develop the skills and knowledge of the students. These programs involve experts from premier Research & Development institutes and colleges like UAS, IBAB and Ugenomics, USA. The students are made adept in the modern techniques followed in the fields so as to create more employability and eligibility for higher studies in premier institutes. The Life Science Association inspires the young minds to work towards the success and enrichment of both themselves as well as the association.

The academic year 2015-16 for the department was eventful. The department organized an inter-collegiate fest "JEEVOTSAV" in association with department of Biotechnology and Zoology.



Nearly 20 colleges from the state participated in the events. The department also organized an exhibition in collaboration with Himalayan Drug Company, Baidyanath and Go Green. Stalls were set up by these companies and of organic farming, Bonsai and floriculture. The department also organized a plant collection trip for CBZ and BCB students to Coorg as part of the curriculum. Students of Agronomy and Agricultural Meteorology specialization visited Krishi Mela organized by UAS, Bengaluru. A book on Birds of Christ University Main Campus—a Pictorial Guide was published during the month of February 2016 by Dr PU Anthony of the Zoology department.



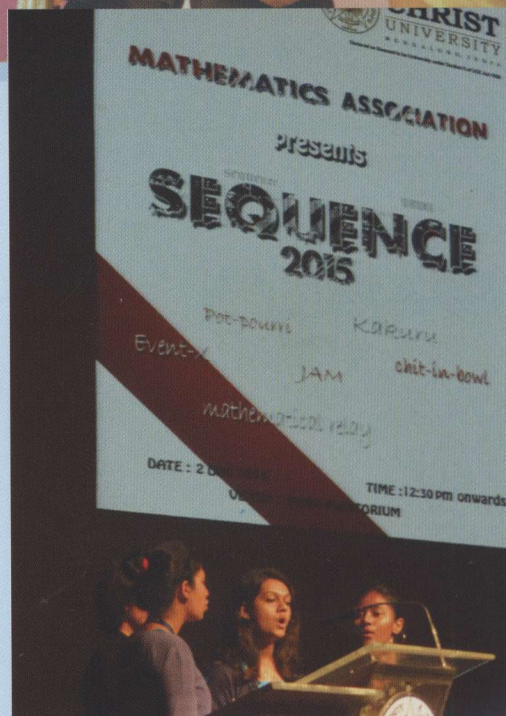
DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

DEPARTMENT OF ELECTRONICS

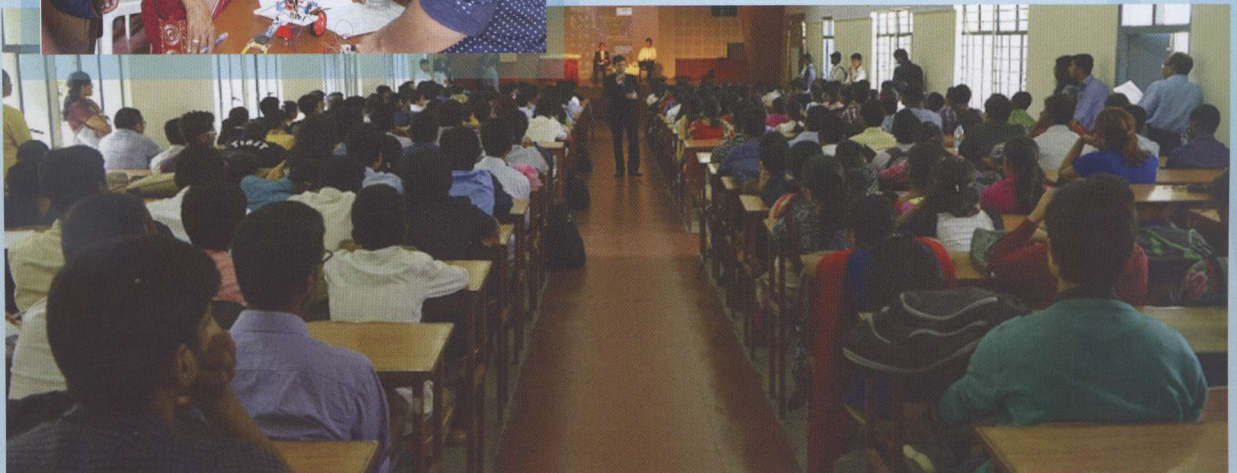

FACULTY OF ENGINEERING

The department of Computer Science and Engineering has always tried their best to live upto their vision statement which says “Foster ethical computational excellence in all areas of technology and to benchmark the institute as one of the top-notch global institutions.” As the department reflect on how the year 2015-2016 went, they believe the year to be an exciting time of innovation. This year, experiential learning and career events took maximum priority.

The eventful year stood witness to 50 mini projects, placement training, higher education training, 9 technical talks, 3 workshops for students, 2 seminars, 1 national conference, 15 conference publication by the students, 17 conferences attended by faculty members, mentoring and counselling, career development cell and students' extracurricular participation. 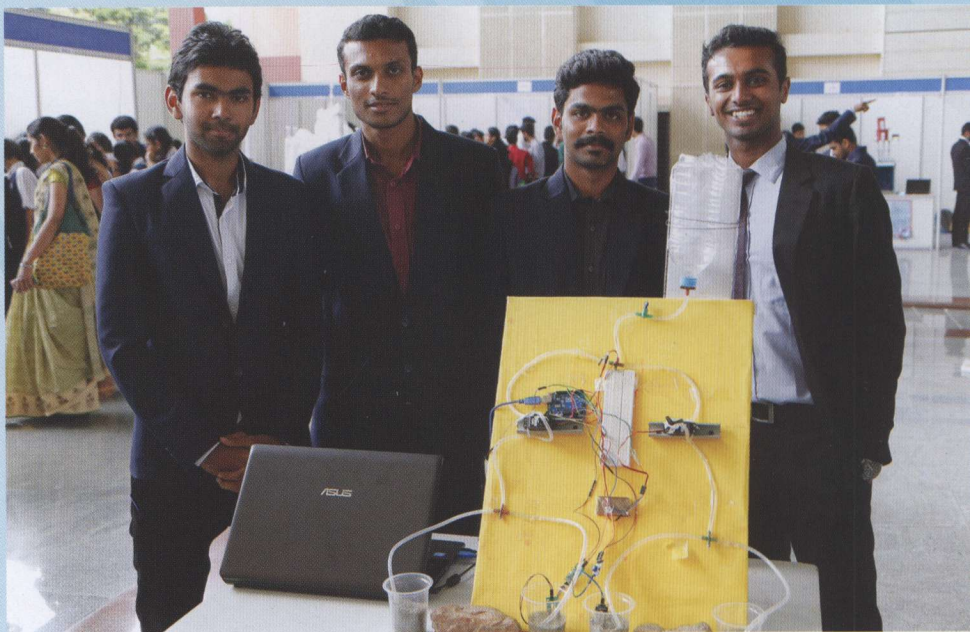
opportunity for the students of civil engineering to undergo a workshop on Construction of Bangalore Metro Rail for 5 days. The

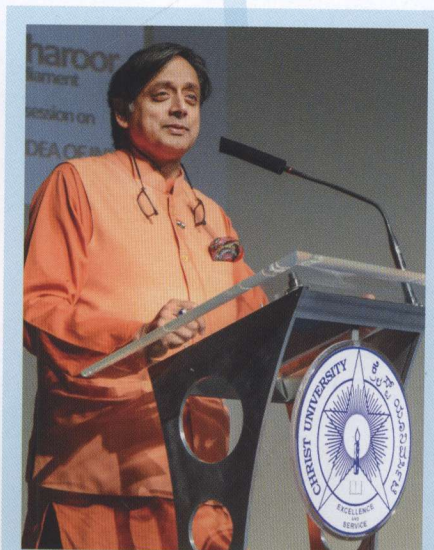
SCHOOL OF LAW

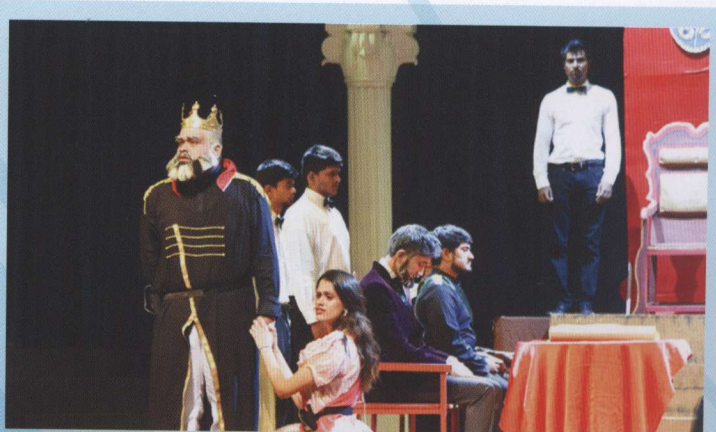

The Institute of Management, Christ University (IMCU) rated as one of the best B Schools in India by the Times 2016 survey, is a B School with its own unique brand and value identity that offers a vibrant two-year full time MBA/PGDM programme that is designed to holistically develop the cohort in line with our mission. Our mission is to develop a community of socially responsible, creative and enterprising leaders to operate in a knowledge-based, globalized and dynamic world.

Besides the structured yet innovative teaching learning pedagogies and several student-driven initiatives that is an integral part of the Institute's programs, the Institute set up an Academic Advisory Board (AAB) comprising of nine members of prominence drawn from academia, industry and governance. The AAB is constituted to act as an independent advisory body that questions, analyses, validates and comments on the core strategic initiative that IMCU pursues on an on-going basis.

IMCU faculty published 20 research papers during 2015-16, of which three were published in Scopus indexed journals or similar. The dedicated Research cell played a key role in the publication milestone.

Centre for Case Research & Development (CCRD) of the Institute of Management published 8 cases authored by the faculty during the current academic year.

Dedicated Consultancy & Training Cell (C&TC) was established on 8th February 2016 to bring strategic focus on the need to connect with industry or corporate entities to offer value-added consultancy and training services.

Yet another event that has become a hallmark of the Institute is 'Connaissance', the annual



National Level Research Paper Presentation. The event aims to foster a research culture among the student community by encouraging them to partake in primary and secondary research. This year, the event received over 40 abstracts and 28 full papers, and saw participation from students across Universities in India vying for the top spot.

IMCU has been actively encouraging budding entrepreneurs through the Centre for Development of Entrepreneurship and Research (CEDAR) culminating each year with the *Pioneer* an event that show cases and recognizes outstanding entrepreneurs for their innovative achievements. The grand finale was held on 21st January 2016.

January 26th each year is much awaited as the University opens its gates and heart to welcome Alumni and their families to the campus. This year was no different with over 150 alumnis in attendance. The air was charged with teachers interacting with old students, and these were proud moments for both the student and teacher.

Cantata, the annual IMCU family and sports day was held at the Kengeri campus on 20th February, 2016.

On the CSR front, IMCU organized the Traffic Awareness day between 3rd and 6th August 2015, Sponsor a Child initiative between 7th and 13th August 2015, Socio Art event to celebrate the Independence day, Street Play on 16th September 2015 to bring awareness on violence endured by

women, Beat Diabetes campaign on 9th November 2015 to name a few.

The MBA placement cell has had yet another successful placement season. Over 130 companies from over 30 industry verticals took part in the campus placements for the graduating class of 2013- 15. In addition, over 200 companies offered internships to our first year students.

The Lean Operations Lab has been set up to provide students opportunity for experiential learning of key operations concepts through the use of innovative and intense games. The lab enables a learner centric environment.

Some of the concepts taught through the lab are the waste elimination (Lean) concepts, value added, non-value added and essential non-value added activities, TAKT time, batch & single piece flow, Bullwhip effect in Supply Chain, and impact of variability & dependability in processes affecting productivity.

Yet another unique proposition was a certification course on Lean Six-Sigma Green belt from KPMG that was provided for the first time at the serene and beautiful Lavasa campus of Christ Institute of Management. It was a step in forging inter campus connect with students from both the campuses interacting actively. The training on Six Sigma was conducted in two batches in January and March 2016, and about 270 students of the Institute of Management including 90 students from the

Lavasa campus attended the sessions and received their Six Sigma Green belt certification from KPMG.

Yet another initiative of the LoS group is the institution of the Quality Circle and competitive events



that drive home concept and importance of quality in operations and challenges in achieving all-pervading quality improvements.

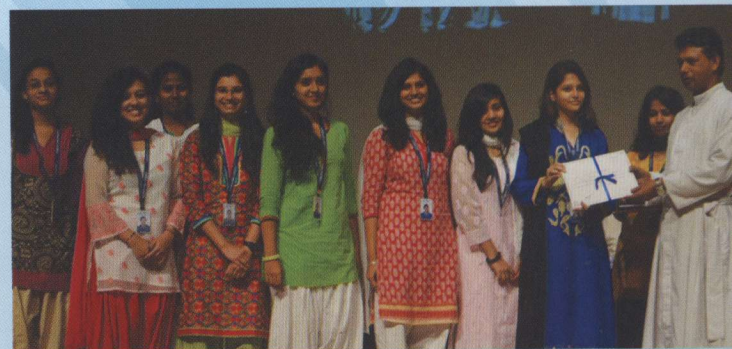


DEPARTMENT OF

CENTRE FOR

Centre for Concept Design (CCD) is the Communication wing of the university. The Green View Studio is the in house production unit of CCD. The studio supports new faculty members to create video lectures for students to

have a learning experience beyond the classroom. This year the studio produced promotional videos for NCC, School of Law, MBA and Faculty of Engineering, for various theatre plays. 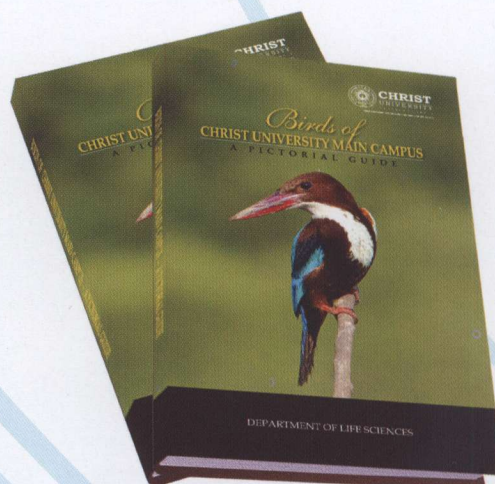
A Capacity Building Programme was held on the

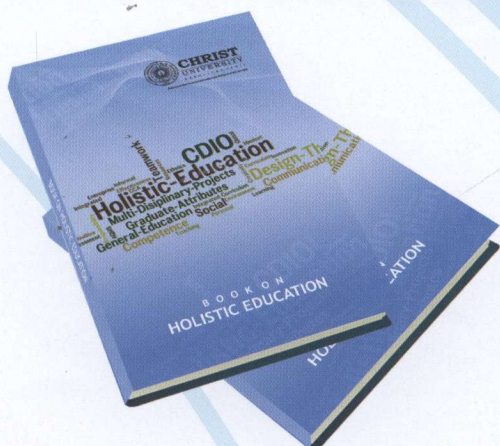

CENTRE FOR
RESEARCH - PROJECTS

Research and continuing activity form the backbone of a university. Accordingly Christ University, assumes a responsive role in order to promote advanced academic research in diversified disciplines through the establishment of the Centre for Research-Projects in 2010. The Centre for Research-Projects in its endeavor to help society, businesses and enterprises to manage risk and uncertainty has different professional groups, who assist and take up 'pure' and 'applied' research assignments. These research projects focus on various issues related to the economy, society, industry, government agencies etc. in the form of major research projects (MRPs), research monographs, and working papers.

The major research projects conceived by the Centre and executed by faculty members of Christ University at different levels in social sciences, natural and physical sciences and applied science disciplines, not only add significant value to society but are also important in the ever changing global scenario. The monograph, which is an in-depth study on a specific theme, concept or model, doctrine; treatise or a report is published by the

Centre to provide an in-depth insight to drive further research or application. Another level is the Working Paper or Work paper that the Centre publishes which provides scholars an opportunity to further deliberate and expand their expertise. Since inception, the Centre has approved 70 MRPs, 37 monographs, and 53 working papers. 24 MRPs, 11 Monographs and 25 Working Papers are completed as of this year. Total Fund sanctioned for new project in 2015-16 is, MRPs Rs. 16,672,000; Monographs Rs. 2651000; and Working papers Rs. 260,000.

For all the above projects, faculty members, industrial executives, scientists from institutions/ organizations are involved in the review of proposals and bi-annual reviews. These projects are approved with due internal vetting, external review and personal defence of proposal before a duly constituted committee with a Vice-Chancellor's nominee.

The highlights of the projects are bi-annual reviews with external experts, publication of research papers, presentations at seminars/ conferences, involvement of students, discussion



with colleagues, inter-disciplinary approaches, panel discussions, interaction with experts, field surveys, involvement of departmental/deanery colleagues, and engagement of students.

CU–Academic Staff College

Christ University recognizes its role as a transformer of value education with the motto 'Excellence and Service' to create an appropriate learning platform for its teachers has established an Academic Staff College in 2011. The CU–Academic Staff College conducts orientation, refresher and quality improvement programs to augment the skill levels, knowledge and competency of faculty members.

The broader perspective of CU-Academic Staff College is: to create awareness of newer methodologies of learning and teaching, add knowledge as a value to our teachers more than other stakeholders of educational system, enable teacher-learner to understand his/her own subject by linking with other subjects and with knowledge at global level, educate our teachers on general aspects of education and allied disciplines. deliberate on research and consultancy activities and opportunities in the market, build the confidence of our teachers with a knowledge

base and improve the educational standards at national and international level.

The orientation programs are for Assistant Professors in the grades of IV and V highlight the various aspects of higher education, academic leadership, value education, innovative methods of teaching – learning pedagogy, etc. The Refresher programs for Professors/ Associate Professors and Assistant Professors grade III and above, emphasizes the contemporary and applied aspects of knowledge in different disciplines leading to advancement in research and consultancy with a focus on multi-disciplinary approaches. The Quality Improvement Programmes (QIP) is about domain knowledge and aimed at all faculty members on capstone areas is subject-specific.

The CU–ASC has so far completed 11 orientation programs, 15 refresher programs, 3 Workshops, 84 QIPs, and moreover 14 QIPs are scheduled for the month of May-June 2016.

The topics pertaining to the programs are discussed well in advance with participants and their inputs taken. The external resource persons are drawn from across the country

CENTRE FOR SUSTAINABLE EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT

Center for Sustainable Education and Development (CSED) is the latest addition to the Christ University family. The center came to force on June 2015 and has completed one year. They focus on providing fee concession to the students and the faculty. They also support in ensuring that there is constant stream of benefits for the university's main stakeholders. They bring in investments to the University through Corporates. Another venture of theirs is the

Alumni Department for which a newsletter and website was released this year.

The Center looks for investments from Corporates for research, sponsorships etc. One of the main highlight of their activity is the corporate project that they bring to the college students which allows them to get hands on experience and also earn as they are studying.

CENTRE FOR SOCIAL ACTION

Centre for Social Action is an agency for promoting volunteerism and enabling students to develop as socially responsible citizens through developmental initiatives. It has been working towards fulfilling this mission right since its inception in 1999. This year one of the main initiatives by CSA was introduction of the new wing 'Prayatna' which will make Christ University a zero waste campus. They also collaborated with 'Drishti', the street theatre wing for bringing about awareness about waste segregation. Activity Centre, the backbone of CSA helps volunteers involved in the daily activity of visiting urban project areas to



teach students from impoverished backgrounds. This year a proper syllabus and resource development programme was implemented which includes 'The Buddy System' where each volunteer is given a buddy- a child from one of the project areas to make the bond between the children and volunteers stronger.



CENTRE FOR ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL SUPPORT (CAPS) |

The Center for Academic and Professional Support (CAPS) is an initiative that envisions transforming learning by bridging the gap between classroom-based theoretical and career-based practical learning by tapping the existing resources within the University.

Some of the CAPS facilities initiated this year are:

1. Christ Online Writing Lab (COWL): First Indian online writing lab that attempts to help students with their academic writing needs by providing access to academic resources, expert-consultation and peer interaction opportunities.
2. CAPS Learning And Shared Sessions (CLASS): Peer mentoring initiative that aims to facilitate further development of professional skills.
3. CAPS Hut of Augmented Learning (CHAL): Organizes outbound training, workshops and training sessions conducted by experts at the University level.
4. CAPS Writing Centre (CWC): A drop-in Centre providing one-to-one peer training by students trained in research and academic writing like APA stylistic writing. CWC aims to establish centers for all the three Bangalore campuses of the University.
5. CAPS Assessment Wing (CAW): An assessment wing for students to assess their Learning Style, Aptitude, Career Interest, Communication Styles, and Moods and feelings.



In this academic year, CAPS successfully conducted 30 peer training sessions on academic and professional topics across University and 7 major CHAL events. The Centre is looking forward to launching a beta version of COWL and customized assessment for CAW.

RESEARCH**About the Centre:**

The Centre for Research was established at Christ University in 2008 to nurture the research talents. Through various academic exchange programs, the centre aims at establishing a universal nature and legitimacy of a research centre. It motivates and facilitates scholars to cultivate an aptitude for intercultural and transnational communications in economic, social, political and scientific spheres.

Major Activities held during the Academic Year 2015-2016**Review meeting for 2013 & 2014 batch PhD Scholars:**

The Centre for Research completed review meeting for the 2013 and 2014 batch PhD Scholars and verified their progress in research.

Admission Procedure for the year 2015 - 2016

The admission procedure commenced in the month of August 2015 and 45 scholars selected for admission for the academic year 2015-2016. Number of students admitted in different disciplines are as follows; Chemistry - 2, Commerce - 3, Law - 2, Computer

Science - 4, Economics - 1. Education - 2, Engineering - 5, Management - 5, Mathematics - 2, Physics, 4, Psychology - 9, Social Work - 2, Media Studies - 2 & Tourism - 2.

Course Work Classes

The Coursework Classes started in the month of December 2015 and will be completed in the Month of June, 2016. The Course Work Classes were conducted under three phases; Course Work Phase I, Phase - II, Phase - III and Phase - IV.

At the end of the course works, the Centre conducts End Semester Examination for the Coursework conducted.

PhD Viva Voce for 2009, 2010, 2011 & 2012 batch PhD scholars

30 PhD scholars have completed their PhD defense and will be awarded PhD degree during the convocation scheduled to be held on 29 May 2016. The PhD Scholars are eligible for PhD Degree under the following disciplines: Computer Science - 4, Psychology - 6, Commerce - 2, Management - 9, English - 1, Physics - 1, Education - 2, Engineering - 1, Economics - 1, Sociology - 1, & Social Work - 2.



OFFICE OF ADMISSIONS

The Office of Admissions with about 12 staff coordinates the application, selection and admission of students to all the academic programmes offered at Christ University. The admission process commences in October each year with the release of applications for the MBA programmes. The admission process closes in December with the PhD admissions.

In 2015 some new Choice Based Credit

programmes were launched: MSc Developmental Studies, MA Economics, MSc Strategic Management, MSc Behavioural Science and MA Educational Leadership and Management. These programmes are interdisciplinary in nature and provide the student flexibility in pursuing the programme.

In 2015 the Office of Admissions processed a record 39996 applications for all the programmes offered.

OFFICE OF ACCOUNTS

The Office of Accounts is like the back bone of Christ University. It manages all the finance and planning related functions of the University. It keeps the accounts up-to date in a transparent and time-bound manner as per the rules and regulations of the University and adhere to the statutory compliances under various laws applicable to the University. An Audit by Indian Audit and Accounts Department (Office of the Principal Accountant General (G&SSA)), Karnataka for the year 2010-11 to 2013-14.

During the NAAC Peer Team Visit, the accounts department was instrumental in providing financial details to other departments to prepare and present their data. Introduction and Implementation of new Payroll Software for easy and effective calculation, disbursement of Salaries and emoluments, filing of statutory returns, Employee Interface option is in the initial stage of Introduction to enable Staff update their income tax savings and related information online. Introduction of Annual Fee Payment by ONLINE mode in collaboration with The South Indian Bank Ltd. for security measures was another innovation by the office.

STUDENT COUNCIL



OFFICE OF EXAMINATIONS

Functioning of office of examinations for the year continued with innovations and strategic changes.

Introducing rubrics and peer review for the internal assessment assignments has helped to enhance its quality. With the introduction of this system all the students were able to view the details of their CIA with evaluation rubrics in the beginning of the semester through their login.

Online examinations for English grammar reduced the duration of the examination to two hours for General English courses in the first year UG programmes. This system also reduced the burden on the faculty members in evaluating the answer scripts. Another major milestone for the office of examinations was the introduction of degree certificates and consolidated marks card with security features such as microchip, invisible UV logo, hidden image, micro text, void pantograph etc which will reduce chances of the duplication of the documents. Certificates are also printed using non tearable stationary.

A new question bank was developed with more than 6000 objective questions for entrance examinations for admissions to various courses in the university. The office also helped the office

of admissions to conduct the examinations to thousands of students who applied for various courses.

This year the office conducted two regular end semester examinations & four supplementary examinations (two for odd & two for even). Two mid semester examinations & two special Mid semester examinations. For MBA/PGDM programmes six trimester examinations and one special supplementary examinations for final trimesters were held apart from managing 8 internal assessment schedules as per the calendar of the university. Results of the end semester examinations were published within 20 days after the last examinations in both semesters. For the even semester a detailed result analysis was presented to the senior management, deans and HODs to decide on strategies in the department to improve the performance of the students.

Out of 2721 final year UG students, 2448, graduated with the pass percentage of 89%, 5% of Students secured first class with distinction, 67% first class, and 17% second class. Out of 1744 final year PG students 1700 graduated with the pass percentage of 97%. 5% Students secured first class with distinction 80%, first class, 13% second class

All the eligible students were admitted to their degrees during the convocations held from 25th May to 29 May 2016. Apart from regular UG and PG programmes, 56 M Phil scholars and 30 PhD scholars were also admitted to their degrees by the chancellor of the university.

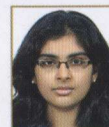

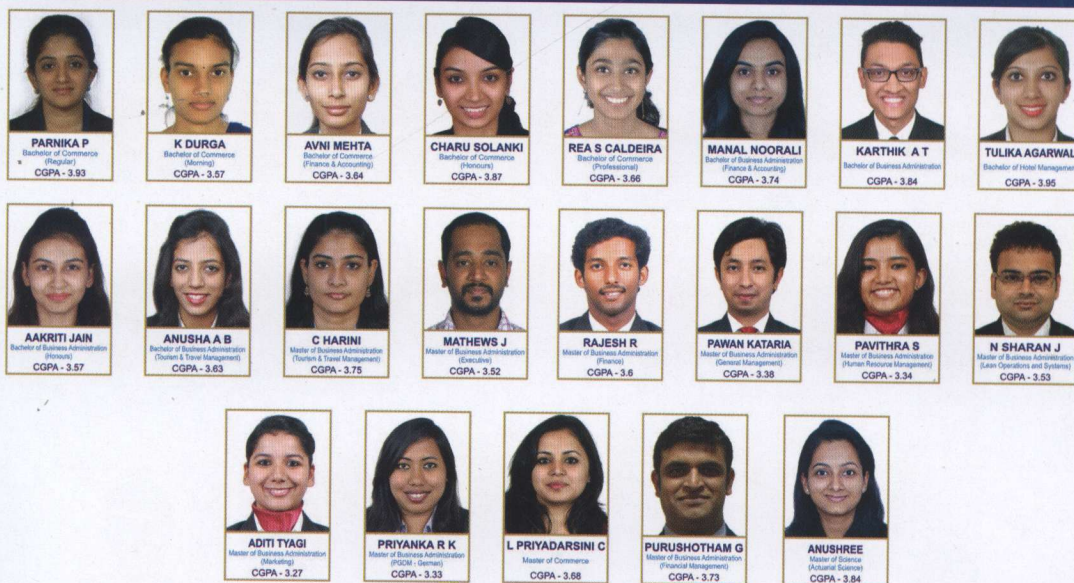

OFFICE OF INFORMATION PROCESSING AND MANAGEMENT

For an organization to work smoothly the role of the central unit is important; and in the case of the Christ University, Bengaluru, the IPM plays a similar role. It is a hi-tech wing which maintains electronic data about various programmes offered, the courses offered and the complete data of its students. Working hand-in-hand with various offices like the admissions, examinations, accounts and the IT Services; it is responsible for providing students with register numbers, Smart-Cards, E-mail ids, various passwords as well as log-in details. The maintenance of the attendance for



the students and the faculty is also a responsibility of the IPM department. It provides the students as well as the HODs information about the attendance and the scores. In case of exams, it is responsible for the proper setting of the hall ticket-its publishing, blocking and release.

OFFICE OF PERSONNEL RELATIONS

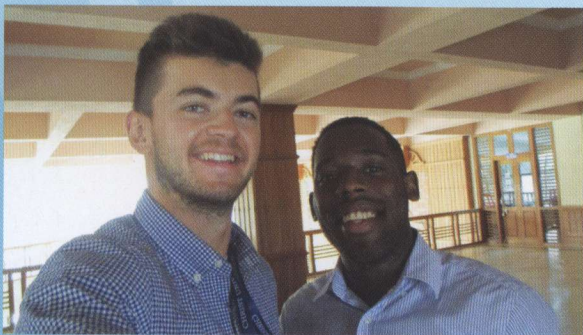


The Personnel Officer is assisted by the office in implementing several responsibilities such as coordinating grievances of faculty and staff, updating employment regulations & certificates, salary fitments, promotions, maintenance of attendance, leave records, personal profile of employees, media advertisements for vacant positions, measures for academic and professional development of employees along with welfare schemes and financial assistance, initiate disciplinary measures against erring employees. The MPhil program for the academic year had its orientation on 22 June 2015 from which 29 guides were empaneled in various departments. Results were processed for 32 students in order to proceed for convocation. The meetings of the staff selection committee (SSC) were held on 28 July

2015 and 18 February 2016. The agenda for both the meetings were to approve the recruitments and the manpower budget submitted by the departments. The annual Faculty and Staff appraisals were held between 29 February and 16 March. The office also organized two programs of FEEL (Facilitating Esteemed Employee Leader), one in November and the other in December for the non-teaching staff. The month of July saw the promotion of 5 faculty members with their letters issued in the same month. For promoting the research activities of faculty members, 60 faculty members are given financial incentives for published article in journals and 29 were reimbursed the registrations fee for presenting in workshops or seminars.

OFFICE OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

The Office of International Affairs (OIAS) witnessed an exciting academic year 2015-16. The main objective of OIAS is to facilitate faculty and student exchanges between Christ University (CU) and foreign universities, in order to bring diversity and promote cultural exchanges. 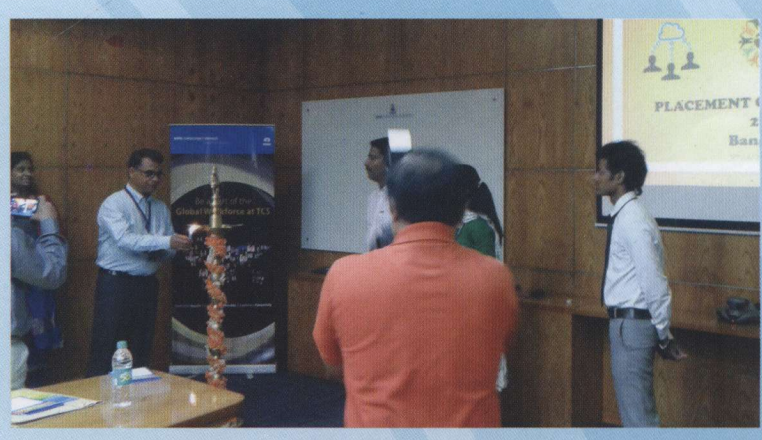

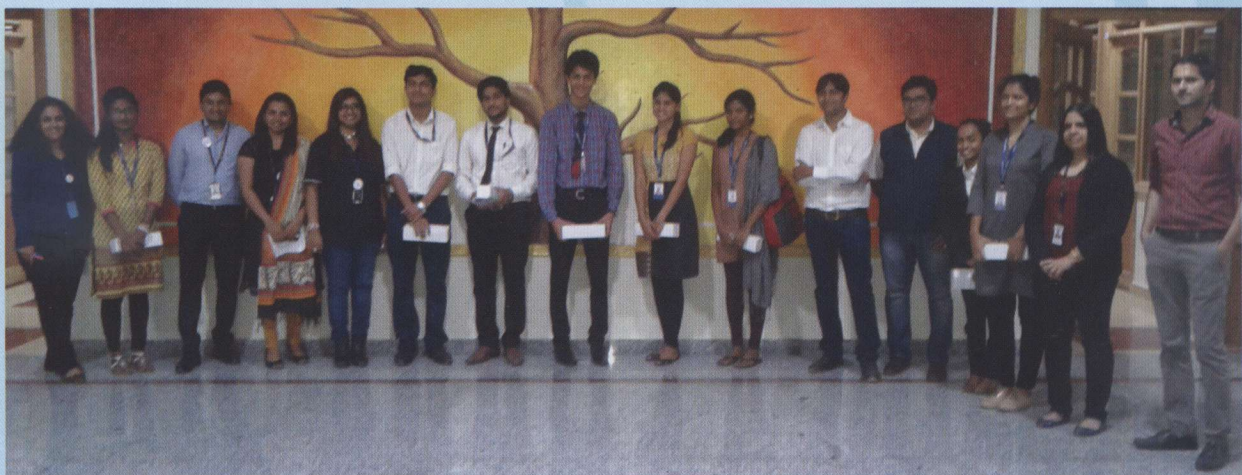
OFFICE OF PLACEMENTS

The Office of Placements at Christ University functions through four different departments consisting of the Undergraduate office, Post-Graduate office, the MBA office and the Department of Law office, each catering to the needs of their respective departments. Among other things, the Office of Placements within campus works towards the professional development of the students by providing them with various skills that could benefit them in the long run.

The UG Placements Office has had a total of 39 companies till date with a total of 498 students already placed as on Feb 13th, 2016 with students being chosen from BA, BCom, BBA and BCA. A number of new companies visited this year: Smart Stream Technologies, Great West Global as well as the regulars like Futures First, Axis Bank and others. The PG Placements Office has had an equally great response with companies like Ernst & Young, Indus International, Azim Premji Foundation, Edelman, IBM, Thomas Reuters and many other companies coming in for placements. The MBA Placements Office has had



approximately 103 companies, including the Big Four (Deloitte, in campus as of February, 2016 with about 70% of the students already placed.



OFFICE OF STUDENT WELFARE

This year, the Student Welfare Office grew in efficiency and has ventured into new territory with the introduction of Cultural Programme at Christ Institute of Management, Lavasa Campus and making Dance Extravaganza for two days of Blossoms.

The Cultural team was placed as the Runners-up this year at BITS Pilani, Goa Campus, in 'Waves 2015'. Apart from that, they also won various college fests within the city. The Christ University Cultural team has also put up a cultural performance at the Christ Institute of Management, Lavasa Campus for the first time which turned out to be a huge success and got appreciation from the people there. 'Blossoms' and 'In Bloom' have also evolved into standard intra and inter collegiate fests, and this year saw the introduction of new events like Turn Coat, Monoacting, Monochrome. In-Bloom 2016 saw more than 50 colleges across the country participating. This year's Dance Extravaganza brought in much more enthusiasm to Blossoms 2015-16 as it was conducted in two days. The University Dance team, 'Natyaparna' and the University Choir always bring life to any



program that happens in the university. This year, Natyaparna staged an innovative dance program called 'TriKaal' with more than 400 dancers taking part in it. Apart from hosting 'Magnificat: A song of Hope' for the 10th year, the Christ University Choir also sang at the Glorious: Festival of Harmony and organized Annual Choir programme 'Sound Curry'.

The Christ University Quiz Association has climbed higher heights in the city with more than 300 Participants participating in various Quizzes across the year. The growth of the Quiz Association has largely contributed to the massive turnout at

the In-Bloom Quiz competition this year with more than 200 teams from various colleges participating. CUQA for the third time organized a National Quiz Championship (CUIZ) in December which was a huge success. An important part of the Christ University vision is for an individual to be nurtured in a holistic and dynamic environment and its fulfillment is ensured by the SWO to perfection.

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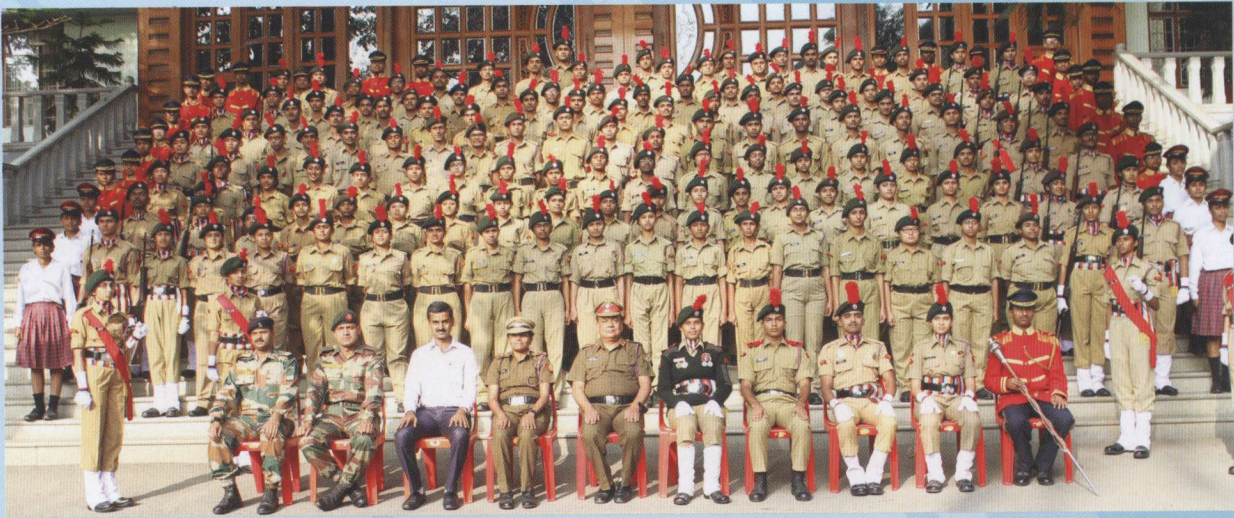
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NATIONAL CADET CORPS

INTERVIEW



DR. GUYDEUK YEON

Professor and Director, Centre for Digital Innovation (CDI)

Q *You have been in India for over 23 years. How has your experience in India been so far?*

Prof Yeon: Being interested in history, India has a long and rich past which was the primary reason that drew me here. I came to India in 1993 and enrolled for Masters in history studies in Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi. Language had been a barrier, moreover, it took me time to get adjusted to the new environment which also had an impact on my health. None of these discouraged me for pursuing my passion which was to become a professor in India and contribute to the youth in the society. When I reflect on these, there is that sense of satisfaction and happiness that I experienced.

Q *Being athletic and very much interested in tennis, with your busy schedule how are you able to strike a balance between the two?*

Prof Yeon: Without sports, I would not be well-balanced. My work consumes most of my time, much more than you think, with managing Centre for Advanced Research and Training (CART), Centre for Digital Innovation (CDI), Asian Collaboration, Question Bank, and building up the new Music-Western Classical, Psychology, English (MPE) programme. To cope with all these, I have to keep tuning myself from one to the other in a fraction of a second like an electrical switch. With such a workload, I feel that I need to play tennis to get some space and relax otherwise it is simply impossible. So for me it is not an option rather it's mandatory. Therefore I make it a point to play in the evening for a minimum of two hours every day.

Q *Being in Christ University for four years now, can you share with us one or two memorable anecdotes.*

Prof Yeon: Three years ago our beloved Vice Chancellor, Dr Fr Thomas C Mathew, asked me, "Can you teach SPSS?" "Yes, I will," I replied. Right after that I raised a question, "By the way what is SPSS?" This was the beginning of Centre for Advanced Research and Training (CART). Anytime I meet our beloved Vice Chancellor, the first thing he will ask me is "Are you happy?". I rarely find anybody asking this as their first question because people normally prioritise their work over people. This is one aspect I hold close because to me he is a fatherly figure. This is home, and I'm happy that I am here.

Q *What is your take on the cultural competence in the university on a personal level?*

Prof Yeon: As for me, Indians are the most beautiful and handsome people. I say this because I like that there is a wonderful blend between the Orient and the West. I get a very energetic and enthusiastic vibe from the Christites who easily socialize with each other regardless of the background. Where I come from, people do not socialize much but it's the very opposite here as there is a good level of interpersonal communication, friendliness and respect amongst the Christites.

Q *What would you see are the few things that are very crucial to you which you would not compromise upon?*

Prof Yeon: My religious belief, the Bible is something I will absolutely not compromise on. Second of all is India. Though I used to get opportunities elsewhere, I have chosen India, Christ University in particular, and will continue to stay here as this is my home and where I want to be.

Q *Heading the Innovation Centre, how do you think it moulds Christites?*

Prof Yeon: A new research culture is what it aims to create through CART. Earlier we used to outsource to get our data analysed but now we are doing it here. We conduct courses on various statistical tools and help teachers to use them.

This semester we opened few courses to students who after which have become facilitators and teach other students. These facilitators bridge the gap between students and teachers and we observed that it has been working really well. In the new academic year, we plan to open all eight courses to all students. We, through CDI, strive to bring out innovative technical solutions targeted towards social good. Partnering with industrial organizations for solving their problems, our teachers and students will be exposed to industry practices.

Q *Sir, what would you say is your motto?*

Prof Yeon: "Not merely to survive, but to thrive". There were few moments in my life that I had to make life decisions. If my life goal was only to survive I could have simply run after a job with high salary. But I wanted to live my life to the fullest. That is why I chose India and chose Christ University. My aim is to reach out various communities through innovation. I call it "Communnovation" which is my second motto.

Q *Any advice that you would like to give to Christites?*

Prof Yeon: From the day one in India, I had a dream to be a professor and do something good for the youth of this land. This dream was my guiding star. It took nineteen years for me to realise the dream. Many a time it looked impossible. But it always gave me a clear direction and enough strength to get over all the hardships. So I would like to suggest my dear Christites to have a dream that will guide you not merely to survive but to live your life to the fullest. After that take challenges as and when they come and make them as your stepping stones to grow. Stepping on soft sand you cannot jump high but standing on top of a stone that is tough and heavy you will be able to exceed your limits.

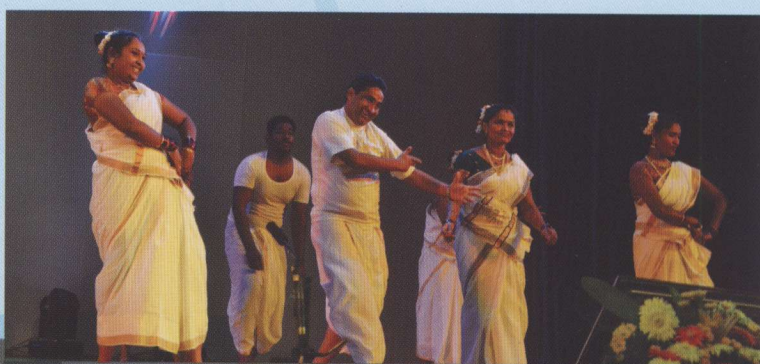
RECTOR'S DAY AND CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS

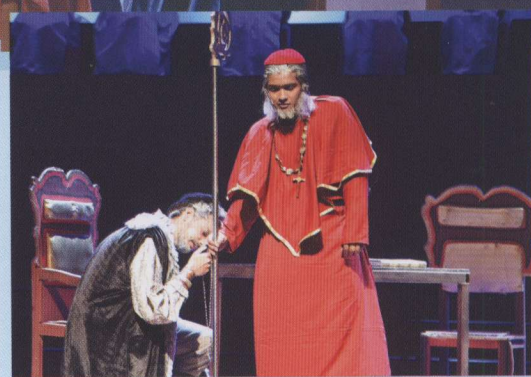

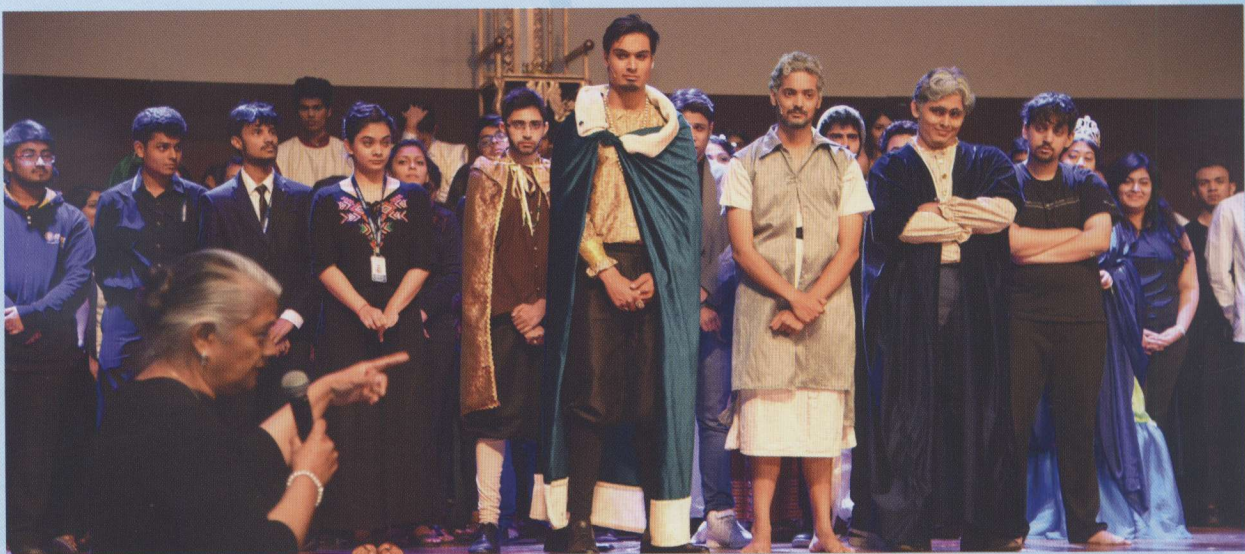
MEGA PRODUCTION |
