


The Department of Mathematics aims on providing quality education and training in a holistic learning environment created by a highly competent and experienced faculty. Aspiring young Mathematicians get nurtured and groomed to contribute significantly to the society. This academic year, the students and faculty of the mathematics department organized a few events and webinars to dive deeper into the world of mathematics.

The department kicked off the first event for the semester on 11th January 2023, when Dr Fr Joseph Varghese, MSc, MA, PhD, Professor, Department of Mathematics from CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore, Central Campus conducted a compelling session in room number 307, on the complexities of Mathematics explaining it in such a riveting manner that every individual of the class was completely engrossed. He enriched the students with his knowledge of Optimization techniques and instilled the skill of utilizing available resources optimally in them. Further, he said "Whatever is available is lost is called zero." Moreover, he elaborated on the Unity concept and emphasized that consistency and precision are the key basis of Mathematics. The students were asked to write a proof of "Prime Numbers are Infinite" on their own in order for them to learn the art of mathematical modelling.



In addition, a riddle was presented to the students wherein three jars with water were asked to be optimized. A student from BSc Economics and Mathematics, Ekansh Lohani was the first to solve the problem and went ahead to explain the class how the jars could be optimized. The session was highly beneficial for the students and gave them a highly educative insight.

Dr Fr Joseph Varghese, Professor from Department of Mathematics at Christ University (Central campus), motivated BSc [EM, CM] students to gain problem solving skills and pursue research in emerging areas in future.



The department then conducted an intra-college treasure hunt, "Clue-Minati" organized by the mathematics association- "Abhisaran" on 10th February 2023. The event was conducted in two rounds. The first round was the quiz round which was held as a qualifier of the treasure hunt round. The teams were given a questionnaire of 15 reasoning and basic mathematics questions. 

Interview with the Centre for Social Actions in Christ(Deemed to be University) -Yeshwanthpur Campus

he Centre for Social Action, initiated by Christ University is a team where the members strive to achieve excellence through social service for the upliftment education and of the underprivileged community of the country. The CSA team of Yeshwanthpur campus began on a note of prayer followed by an orientation. Further, the selected candidates were taken to Central and BGR campuses to gain. The CSA is structurally divided into different wings responsible for particular tasks.

They are headed by wing heads, Student Representatives, and a five member Strategic Team. Currently, the center has 576 volunteers working to fulfill their vision. The Activity Centre focuses on rural community service in places like the Kolar District. The second wing-Drishti is where they connect with the community to create awareness on social issues in creative forms such as dance, art and street plays. They conducted a street play on Women's day for the working staff, and provided mental health awareness by organizing a rural camp.



Another wing called Prayatna focuses on the aspects responsible for the development of a sustainable world. They also oversee the segregation of dry waste and wet waste. Parivarthana- a subwing, deals with recycling of wastes by converting them into sheets which are then used for making 26 varieties of products for everyday use. Stalls are set up every month where these recycled products are sold to raise funds which goes for the benefit of the women working in the Parivarthana plant in central campus, these ladies are fondly called *Akka* by the students. The Child Sponsorship wing focuses a minimum of Rs. 4,250 for underprivileged children by providing them not only with education, but also with proper school kits. As of now, the Yeshwantpur Campus has succeeded in contributing 1.5 Lakh rupees for the same.

The Artifacts wing is unique the to Yeshwanthpur campus which has succeeded in that raising funds was used for the whitewashing and painting of a community.

The CSA also helps make sure that the waste management in the campus happens smoothly. To ensure this, the housekeeping management segregates the leftover food in the cafeteria into dry waste and wet waste through recycling activities. There is also a section of E-Waste disposal, which is also used for similar purposes.


GRACE IN MOTION Interview with Mahek Jaiswal
