eventful year began with inauguration followed by orientation for a batch of 100 enthusiastic aspiring teachers. We were briefed about the various activities for the year ahead which left us eager and excited to get started.

We commenced the academic year with the event Back to School which helped break the ice and provide a platform for us to showcase our talents. 'Bookmark', a university level event was a route for us to get familiarized with the library system at Christ University. A three day workshop with the 'Fourth Wave Foundation' on Personality Development was conducted to equip the student-teachers with skills to face various challenges with confidence.

The article review activity paved the way for all of us to question, analyse and critically approach a body of work. There was an informative panel discussion on Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation which focused on holistic education keeping in mind the development of all aspects of a student's personality. We had a programme on Theatre in Education that helped us to be innovative and generate creative ideas in teaching. We got a taste of the school environment through the school visits to Christ School, Christ Academy and Gear Innovative International School which invoked in us feelings of both excitement and apprehension. A State level workshop on Classroom Management was

organised by the department, Mr. Chandrashekar, the resource person brought to light new methods of effective classroom management through interactive sessions and activities.

The much awaited month-long practice teaching across 16 schools in Bangalore gave us an opportunity to put to test all the theoretical knowledge gathered in the B.Ed classroom. A week long cultural fest Kalasaurabha was exclusively held for the student-teachers of BEd where teams competed on an artistic level. A National level Seminar on 'Curricular Transactions in Primary and Secondary Education in India' was organized which attracted delegates from across the country to present and discuss about issues and trends in the field of education. Student-teachers learnt to organize, conduct and actively participate in Sports Day held at Christ University, Kengeri Campus. A Community Living Camp was conducted in Kolar, which helped us to work together as a team and appreciate village life.

This year has instilled in us confidence to be responsible teachers and truly make a difference. What started out as a distant dream has now become a possible reality.

SCHOOL VISIT

School visit has been incorporated as part of the B.Ed curriculum in order to provide an exposure to the school environment. In the month of August the students visited Christ School on Bannerghatta Road and were given the chance to interact with the teachers, students and heads of the institutions. The class was divided into groups and was asked to write a report on their experiences.

Having studied Howard Gardner's Theory of Multiple Intelligence in our classroom we were very eager to see it in practice at Gear International School. It was a great opportunity to look at an innovative school setup. On 13 March 2013 the students were privileged to visit "Gear Innovative International School" and were able to have a glimpse into the functioning of the school. We were also given an insight into how it had successfully incorporated the method of Multiple Intelligence into

their curriculum. It is a school that is directed towards modern research based education, and employs futuristic tools towards curriculum development. Howard Gardner's Theory of Multiple Intelligences is its guiding philosophy and all classroom activities and concepts were developed on the understanding that each child was unique and could excel in his area of intelligence. We had an interactive session with the school's teachers and principal who explained how they were successfully able to translate this theory into practice.

After this we went on to visit Christ Academy on Begur-Koppa Road. We were greeted by the Principal and School of Education Alumni teachers, who very enthusiastically enlisted the core beliefs of the school and the various scholastic and non-scholastic activities at the school. We felt connected to these teachers as they were our seniors and were able to enlighten us in a very matter -of -fact- way. Our briefing session was done in the open park of the school. We were then taken for a guided tour of the school.

The school is an ideal example of how scholastic and non-scholastic activities are seamlessly integrated for the holistic development of the child. Its biggest asset is its motivated faculty of teachers and principal. They certainly motivated us.

The school visit exposed us to innovative school practices and gave us an insight into how dedicated and creative teachers can draw out the innate qualities and talents of the students by providing a nurturing and safe environment.

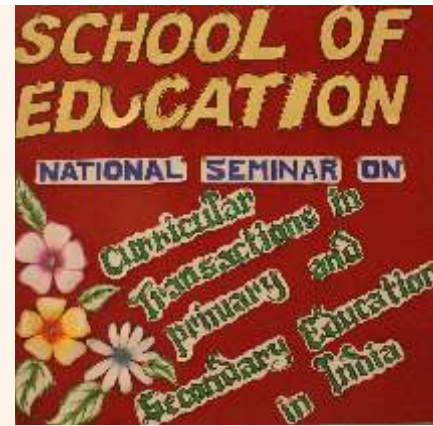
Bookmark
