Communication Skill

Reading the Lines and between them

We are all aware of the importance of communication in our day to day life. It is essential for good interaction, expression, sharing information, to bring out the creativity in each and every person. To simplify things and to give a clear understand ing about communication in academic arena, on 25 June, 2013 Mr. Padmakumar M.M, Department of English and Media Studies at Christ University, conducted a small yet effective workshop on Communication Skills to groom the teachers to be.

A brief introduction was delivered about the speaker, who then introduced the role of a Teacher in the true sense. Many students actively participated in this exercise. Several activities were planned keeping in mind the four keys to good communication namely Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing (LSRW).

Listening skills (Balloon Activity)

This activity indicated that 'teachers' are not just active speakers but they should also take on the role of a listener.

Speaking skills (Sentence Formation)

This activity focused on the formation of complete sentences using the 25 random words written on the board.

Reading skills (Questionnaire)

This activity was to test the reading ability and accuracy of students. Like Mr. Padmakumar rightly mentioned, "It is not about how many books you have read, but how well you have read it.

Writing skills (Basketball Activity)

This activity stated that writing is all about multi-tasking. Your thoughts are



in process, and the final stage is to jot it all down.

It helped the students of School of Education open their minds to better methods for delivering effective communication. Mr. Padmakumar executed the session in a manner which enabled the students to be better communicators while adapting to their roles as teachers, as well as introducing them to the four powerful keys to good communication.

Value Education needs a Change...

From my few years of the revered values of the past. experience of being with students at secondary school, I have realized the need for a new mode of teaching value education. We are familiar with the modern trend that is very much a part of a student's life. This effect of modernity is easily absorbed by today's generation even when it seems hard for the elders to learn it.

It is true that values need to change according to the changing times. But certain core values need to be fostered irrespective of generations that come. Core values of harmony, brotherhood, being sensitive to those in need, honesty, sharing and the like are at a loss today, because of the values portrayed newer by technological era that has overtaken

Students are no more interested to attend such classes. In some schools, the way these classes are programmed, even ind icate that value education has rather less importance in the curriculum. The need of the hour is to have a pedagogical change with adequate importance given to analytical skills to inculcate values.

I am looking forward to a model that is neither strict nor too flexible, named the Discovery model. Here, cases of violence, issues of disturbance in the political, social, moral and emotional lives of the people. Students arrive at the value that needs prominence through discussion. They debate, discuss and prioritize the values for today with a

view towards comparing and contrasting the right values for adequate growth. Issues like atrocities on women, relevance of capital punishment, and lack of honesty (corruption) can provide a multid imensional search on violence from a communitarian perspective and end with ind ividual responsibility. These must be presented to the students as challenges and not as problems to be faced. We need to innovate and progress in the continual search for adequate and effective mode of inculcating values in our children rather than sticking to a proposed model that may lead to routinization. Why not call Value Education classes as Intellectual Critical sessions (ICS)?

All the World's a Stage

The Theatre in Education (TIE) workshop was held on 9 July. The day began with a workshop by Mr. Ashok Kumar on creating music using simple percussion. Mr. Ashok is the frontman of the fusion band Shoonya and is one common objects on the floor and asked all the participants to pick up each object and speak a few lines about the thoughts it evoked within them. Mr. Anand then proceeded to educate us on the basics of street theatre and how

He divided us up into smaller groups and asked us to come up with a simple percussion using musical instruments and later he asked us to embellish our tunes with voices and movement. And the results surprised us all! Each group produced a piece of music that was not only pleasing to the ear, but also original; something none of us would have imagined possible an hour ago.

next session The was conducted by Mr. Abhay Sharan who has quit a successful career in the software industry to start Rangmanch, an organization ded icated to nurturing and developing the performing arts. His portion of the workshop was titled 'Where the mind is without fear'. Here we were to perform the play 'Yaksha's Questions', a story from the Mahabharata. We learned how the human form could be used on stage with minimal props to create the elements needed in the story.

The third workshop on street theatre was facilitated by Mr. Anand, a former Christite who has performed over 300 street plays. He began with an ice breaker where he kept three n proceeded to educate us l cs of street theatre and how f it d iffered from p conventional theatre. We t then performed a short play i on d ifferent social issues of that we found relevant.

The final session of the day was led by Mr. Upendra Raghavendra, the artistic director of the Foundation for Artists

and Craftsmen Empowerment. His workshop was all about understand ing how an actor uses his body in d ifferent ways in relation with the props, other actors and the stage itself, to convey d ifferent messages to the aud ience. Mr. Upendra then moved on to explaining how an actor on the



stage projects his voice in different directions depending upon the scene. To conclude this session he created a small story with minimal dialogue but using all the physical expressions he taught us. Our task was to rehearse this play and perform it in front of the entire class. After a few rounds of hectic rehearsals, we walked out apprehensively to face our classmates.

The day concluded with each of the four groups performing a piece based on the last session they had attended. The various talents among our classmates really amazed us. As we went home that evening, exhausted but satisfied, we could not help but reflect upon the fantastic day we had been through. A day which had helped us all overcome our inhibitions to a large extent and one which had been full of learning. So many elements of performing in theatre are relevant to the work we will be doing as teachers in classrooms and the experience gained through the Theatre in Education workshop would certainly stand us in good stead in the future.

Teaching Aids Display

From Concept to Reality

The Teaching Aids Display was conducted on 10 January, 2014 at the Gourmet Hall in Central Block.

The Mathematics team displayed interesting and exciting models ranging from Geo-board to proving sum of angles of triangles, Pascal's triangle, volume of prism by using build ing blocks and the Pythagoras theorem.

The Physics team displayed working models of bristle bot, tri-bot, beetle bug, solar cooker, pinhole camera, electro-magnetic induction, total internal reflection, multiple reflection and a kaleidoscope.

The Biology team displayed models of human circulatory system and digestive system along with animal cell, clay models of amoeba and hydra. Three dimensional models of human heart, cross section model of skin, working model of kidney functioning were also d isplayed.



The Chemistry team d isplayed working models of electrolysis, salt water conducting electricity, chromatography, water cycle, structure of an atom, ionic bond ing, and baking soda forming carbond ioxide and many others.

The English team displayed some out of the box 3D models. We also got a chance to see how effectively flip charts, flow charts, vocabulary charts, character cube and grammar games were used. The Social Science team d isplayed a range of time lines of eminent people from history like Akbar and other Mughul Emperors, flip charts, maps, models of monuments like the Taj Mahal, Qutub Minar and The Pyramid of Giza.

Thus the teaching aids display gave an opportunity to each individual student-teacher from the respective methodology to display the teaching aids used during the teaching practice.
