MALAWI GOVERNMENT BANS PROTESTS

Government has banned post-election demonstrations and has warned Malawians that police will use force against any person who defies the order. In a statement last night, Minister of Information Mark Botomani said government will not grant any permission for demonstrations which the Human Rights Defenders Coalition (HRDC) plan to conduct from Wednesday to Friday this week. Botomani said the decision has been taken because all recent demonstrations by the HRDC

have turned out to be riotous despite assurances by the organizers that they would be peaceful.

"Government is convinced that conveners of these demonstrations deliberately abuse the right demonstrate to achieve other ulterior agendas," the minister said. He added that demonstrations will be banned until such a time when it is possible for the HRDC to organize peaceful demonstrations. Botomani advised Malawians to ignore any notice of demonstrations from the HRDC.

In June, its High Court determined that the law that criminalized "carnal knowledge of any person against the order of nature" was discriminatory, unconstitutional against public interest therefore ruling in favor of the LGBTQ.

South Africa. Botswana joined Mozambique Seychelles and legalize homosexuality. This ruling is a tremendous victory for all LGBTQ people in Botswana. MOZAMBIQUE LAUNCHES LEGAL ACTION OVER \$2BN DEBT SCANDAL

Mozambique has finalised charges against 20 people, including the son of former president Armando Guebuza, in connection with a \$2 billion debt scandal that crippled the economy. Of the 20 individuals under formal indictment, 10 have been arrested, one of whom was released on bail. Secret loans totalling around \$2 billion were contracted by the government between 2013 and 2015 to finance a tuna-fishing fleet and a maritime surveillance project.

When it emerged, that government had

borrowed the money secretly, Mozambique — which relies foreign aid and is one of the world's poorest countries — was plunged into its worst financial crisis ever as donors suspended funds. Former finance minister Manuel Chang has been held in South Africa since December at the request of US authorities for allegedly receiving \$17 million in kickbacks related to the scandal. South African courts are expected to say next Tuesday whether Chang will be extradited to the US or Mozambique.



MP CASTS DOUBT ON INTRODUCING MINIMUM WAGE BEFORE 2020

CONGOLESE REFUGEES RETURN HOME FROM ANGOLA

Congolese refugees who fled to Angola to escape fighting between armed groups and military forces in 2017 are beginning to return home, according to Angolan officials and UNHCR, the United Nations refugee agency. Some 8,000 refugees have been on the move for the past week, with more than 1,400 already returned to the Kasai provinces. They are among thousands of registered

Congolese refugees who say they want to go home.

The UN agency has been working closely with both governments to ensure that international law preventing the forcible return of refugees is honored. UNHCR said it is monitoring the transit routes as well as working within DR Congo to support the returning refugees.

Following Pharaka's complaint filed via TRIAL International- a human rights committee, the UNHRC has directed the Nepal government to ensure that the victims of forced labor and

torture is able to file complaints easily and receive justice following the same. Bholi Pharaka began work as a domestic help with a Nepal Army officer in 2010. The full-time job demanded Pharaka to work for 18 hours a day between 4 am to 10 pm per day.



6.0 MAGNITUDE EARTHQUAKE SHAKES THE FIJI ISLANDS

On the eve of the 50th Pacific Islands Forum Meeting taking place in Tuvalu this week, the Commonwealth Secretary-General Patricia Scotland recognises the existential threat which climate change poses to Pacific Islanders. She calls on governments across the globe to urgently meet the terms of the Paris climate change agreement, if we are to save our Pacific Islands, as the rising sea levels could literally engulf thousands of islands in the region by 2100.

The common wealth finance access hub, common wealth blue charter and the disaster risk finance portal are expected to provide financial and technological assistance for the same. Till date commonwealth finance access club has provided up to \$25.7 million, with a further \$367 million in the pipeline. It does so by embedding long-term specialists within ministries to provide expert advice and to build local capacity for the longer term.



NISSAN, BMW, VW IN TALKS TO HELP SOUTH AFRICA SWITCH TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES

Nissan Motor Co., BMW AG and Volkswagen AG among are carmakers in talks to bring the revolution electric-car to South Africa, as the nation's auto-factory floors risk being left behind in the global switch to greener vehicles. The industry is preparing a unified stance on electrification to present to the government by the end of the year, Mike Mabasa, chief executive officer of the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers of South Africa, or Naamsa, said in an interview. Among the goals is persuading lawmakers to reduce or drop a 23 per cent import tariff on

electric vehicles to help ramp up nascent domestic sales, he said.

Another is to roll out a charging infrastructure in a country where the state-owned power monopoly is in deep financial crisis. Taking steps to boost the popularity of electric vehicles in South Africa is just one part of the equation. The automanufacturing industry makes up about 7per cent of the country's economy, according to Naamsa. The sector is one of the more positive aspects of an economy expected to grow at less than 1per cent for a second consecutive year.

Gotabaya, 70, a brother of former President Mahinda Rajapaksa, was a powerful defence bureaucrat under his brother's government, which defeated the Tamil Tiger rebels' 26-year revolt in 2009.

"My top priority will be ensuring security the without in country allowing extremist terrorists to raise their heads," he said at the rally after he was declared as the candidate of SLPP. The Sri Lankan presidential elections which are scheduled to be held in November will see a tough contest between Gotabaya Rajapaksa Maithripala incumbent the Sirisena of SLFP.
